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

Making a Splash!

A couple years ago there was an initiative to build some "luxury condominiums" on the same property as the Hilton adjacent to the Oakwood subdivision. As part of this proposal was to be a new natatorium,

unlike anything else in the state. As most of you know, while the condos did not materialize, the natatorium did, on what used to be some of the parking and soccer fields on the south side of Ty Warner Park.

I was fortunate enough to get a tour of the enormous complex, which features a 50-meter Olympic-size competition pool as well as

a 25-yard training pool. It looked big from the outside, but the inside was stunning, with features like seating for 1,200 spectators that wraps around three sides of the pool, plus a weight room, concession stand, and swim shop. It even has a party room, though with Covid restrictions this hasn't been usable yet.

I can go on and on about some of the stats, but you can see them for yourself on their website at

<u>www.fmcnatatorium.org</u>... the big question a lot of people ask me is "can WE use the pool?"

The answer to that question is a resounding "YES". While the FMC Natatorium does have a large portion of their schedule blocked out for

swim meets and practices and the like, there are intentionally spots carved out of the calendars for open lap swim as well as vouth and adult lessons. The rates for the various programs are listed on their web site, however it's worth noting that Westmont residents get a discount for many of



the services such as the lap swim pass and assorted lessons.

There's more to say about this facility and the multitude of opportunities it provides to our community than I have room to go into here, but I encourage any of you who enjoy swimming or want to learn to go in and check it out.

<u>UPDATE Oakwood's Grant Project with</u> <u>DuPage County</u>

In early April, the OHA entered into an agreement with DuPage County where the county would provide \$500 of a \$2,000 water quality project. The approved project will utilize native plants with deep root systems to improve water quality on a 100-foot section of the Eastern Shoreline. The goal is to reduce pollutant loading in the water associated with water runoff resulting in improving water quality.

On Saturday May 15, workers from TJ's Landcare installed over six hundred native plants (600) on the project site. A misty rain in the morning did nothing to slow down their progress. The following plants were installed:

Blue Flag Iris Cord Grass

Switch Grass Big Blue Stem

Oxeye Sunflower Brown Eye Susan

Purple Cone Flower Compass Plant

<u>Don't Dump - Storm Sewers Drain to Lake</u>

In Oakwood, water from the streets empties into Lake Charles from the storm water sewers. Pollution, gas, oil, fertilizer, cigarette butts, soil, dirt are some of the major pollutants that also enter our water system from the streets. Pollution impacts the water quality of Lake Charles, our community, neighborhood and property values.

What can we do the help?

- Cleanup pet waste so the bacteria and nutrients do not wash to the lake.
- Sweep down sidewalks and driveways rather washing the pavement down with a hose.
- Don't fertilize your lawn if there are heavy rains in the forecast.
- Don't allow exposed soil to wash into the street.
- Treat yourself to a car wash instead to washing the car in the street. The carwash recycles the water it uses.
- Advise your contractors not to dump waste material into the storm sewer.

Lake Front Homeowners:

- Do not mow the grass up to the shoreline. Establish a no mow zone of ten feet to your beach area to filter the soil and nutrients from going to the lake.
- Use the lake water to water your lawn. You will be providing nutrients to your lawn as well save water.
- Remove non-native vegetation from your shorelines, such as Purple Loosestrife, and replace with native shoreline plants.
- Do not dispose of soil, grass clippings, or leaves into the lake.
- Do not allow exposed soil to wash into the lake.
- Use native shoreline plants with deep root systems to reduce erosion to your shoreline.



Attention Lakefront Home Owners

Heavy Rain Storms with high winds can pop up any time from early spring to late fall. In advance of a storm please move or secure all items near the lake to higher ground. When going on vacation it is also important to prepare your property for storms that might happen while you are away. Boats need to be secured so they do not float out into the water. Boats that end up blocking the outlet will cause higher than normal water levels and result in flooding. In years past we have seen tables, umbrellas and even potted plants in the lake after heavy storms.

Fishing in Lake Charles

If you are ever looking for something to do in the spring or summer, you should consider testing your luck fishing in Lake Charles. The lake is stocked with bass, bluegill and catfish. Fathead minnows and shiners are also stocked annually in the early spring. The lake even has crappie, which are not stocked, but are clearly present. Some of the fish that make Lake Charles home are discussed in greater detail below. Part of the fun is you just never know what you are going to catch!



Largemouth Bass

Considered by many to be one of the most enjoyable fish to angle, Largemouth Bass are one of the most soughtafter fish in North America. When stocked properly with an adequate supply of Bluegill and Fathead Minnows, these fish may grow as much as 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per season. A reminder that bass and catfish in Lake Charles are catch and release, but you are welcome to keep bluegill and crappie.



Channel Catfish

Channel Catfish are one of the easiest fish to manage in a pond or small lake. They can feed on live forage or you can supplement with a commercial feed. Supplemental feeding will often allow the catfish to achieve growth rates sometimes exceeding 1 1/2 pounds per season. These fish can be stocked independently or as part of a combination stocking with Largemouth Bass and Bluegill. Catfish fry (i.e. baby catfish) are easy prey and provide another food source for largemouth bass.



Bluegill

Bluegills normally reach lengths of 6–9 inches, although some can exceed 10" in length and weigh more than 1 lb. Despite their small size relative to other game fish, bluegills are highly spirited fighters when on the end of a fishing line and are among the most popular fish to catch in North America. They are frequently stocked in ponds and lakes.



Crappie

There are two types of crappie that are most common: Black Crappie and White Crappie. The White Crappie are much more prolific than the Black Crappie. White Crappie in most cases, take over smaller ponds and lakes. White Crappie should never be stocked in impoundments less than 100 acres. Black Crappie can be stocked in ponds as small as 1 acre without any concern of overpopulation. Crappie are typically similar size to bluegill but can occasionally exceed 15" in Midwest ponds and lakes.

Hello Oakwood,

Are things returning to normal? Somewhat, maybe. I guess it depends on how each of us defines normal. One thing I'm sure you all have heard, or witnessed by now, is how NOT normal the housing market is. Inventory remains incredibly low, prices are skyrocketing, and there seems to be multiple offers far above list on just about every home out there. Although there are properties consistently coming on the market, they are being scooped up within days of being listed. As a realtor, I can say from experience that the current situation is stressful for all parties involved. Buyers are stressing about being

outbid on offer after offer, sellers are stressing about selling too quickly with nowhere to go, and good realtors are stressing about how to keep the best interests of their clients in mind while navigating all the turbulence. In the meantime I thought it would be interesting to share all that has gone on in Oakwood over the past 16 months. With over 425 single family homes in Oakwood, the year 2020 saw 13 properties change ownership. A very low number even during the pandemic when compared to the market in Westmont as a whole. At the time of this writing, there are 4 homes that have closed in 2021 with 4 additional currently listed for sale or under contract.

Hello neighbors! Each year, the Village of Westmont coordinates, schedules, and performs a number of construction updates that improve our community's infrastructure for our residents and businesses. Also, the County and

State perform various construction projects that may impact our community. Following is a list of scheduled construction projects that will impact the Village of Westmont in the upcoming year. It should be noted that weather and other circumstances may impact the schedule of various projects.

2021 Construction Projects

31st Street Construction Project

While not located in Westmont, the 31st Street road construction project may affect Westmont motorists travelling north of the community. There will be lane closures on 31st Street from west of Illinois Route 83 to Spring Road. The project will begin in May and continue through late fall.

Oakmont Lane Water Main Project

Oakmont Lane to Westmont High School

Construction of 470 feet of 12" PVC water main. Construction includes water main, one hydrant 2 valves and other related work.

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Westmont News: Community Unit School District 201

Dear Oakwood Homeowners Association:

As always thank you for your tremendous support. We know that most of the funding for Westmont High School is provided by local property taxes, and we are grateful for all that you do to make public education possible.

You should know that your support has led to Westmont High School becoming the most improved and one of the top performing high schools in Illinois and the nation. While I am the proud principal, I do not expect you to take my word for this. Please consider the extensive evidence that clearly demonstrates the amazing results at Westmont High School.

The organization GreatSchools.org, which ranks

every public school in the United States, gave Westmont High School a 10 out of 10 rating. Westmont is the only high school in DuPage County to earn the highest rating on a website that is viewed by millions of people as they are in the home buying process (this rating comes up every time someone uses Zillow to do a search). Westmont is one of only 15 regular high schools in the state to earn this ranking (out of over 650). You can

go to GreatSchools.org for more information.

Westmont High School has also earned the highest rating, Exemplary, from the Illinois State Board of Education every year and is one of the very few high schools in Illinois to earn this rating. You can go to Westmont High School – Illinois School Report Card – for more information.

In the Jay Mathews – Washington Post Challenge Index 2020, featured in the new book "An Optimist's Guide to American Education," Westmont High School ranks number one of non-selective enrollment high schools in Illinois. In a list dominated by selective enrollment and affluent schools, Westmont ranks in the top 1% in the nation while over 30% of our students live in economic poverty. This is the oldest national system that

ranks high schools in the United States, and Westmont ranks number 2 overall in Illinois and number 154 in the nation (top 1%).

In the U.S. News and World Report rankings of the Best High Schools in America, Westmont High School is the most improved regular high school in Illinois, and ranks number 552 in the nation (the top 2%) and in the top 1% for regular high schools.

Westmont was recognized in 2020 as the Best Professional Learning Community in America as the winner of the DuFour Award. This award is the largest cash prize in the country (\$25,000.00). A committee of 15 educational leaders and authors from throughout the country served as judges for this most prestigious award and selected Westmont as the best in the United States.

Dr. Anthony Muhammad, a leading author and speaker on school culture and equity has stated "The gains at Westmont High School, especially for students of color and students of poverty, should be studied by scholars nationally and internationally as a beacon of hope for schools striving to produce equity."

99% of students have graduated from Westmont High School over the last 7 years, and test scores have also been excellent (please see Westmont High School - Illinois School Report Card).

Westmont's Advanced Placement program is also one of the most improved and top performing in the country, and school climate as measured by the 5 Essentials Survey has also been outstanding.

These accomplishments are the result of an entire school community effort. We are proud and most grateful to the entire Westmont School Community for your support. Please spread the word because these amazing accomplishments are a result of all of us working together.
